## Solutions to Fix the "Undoing Changes Made to Your Computer" Error

5. Restart your computer normally to see if the problem is fixed.

### Solution 3: Run the Windows Update Troubleshooter

1. Open the Settings app and go to "Update & Security" > "Troubleshoot".
2. Scroll down and click on "Windows Update", then click "Run the troubleshooter".

3. Follow the on-screen instructions to complete the troubleshooting process.
4. If any issues are found, the troubleshooter will attempt to fix them automatically.

### **Solution 4: Rename the Software Distribution Folder**

1. Press Windows + X and select "Command Prompt (Admin)" to open an elevated Command Prompt.
2. Type the following commands, pressing Enter after each one:
  - 'net stop wuau servicing'
  - 'net stop bits'
  - 'ren C:\Windows\SoftwareDistribution SoftwareDistribution.old'
  - 'net start wuau servicing'
  - 'net start bits'
3. Close the Command Prompt and restart your computer.

### **Solution 5: Perform a System Restore**

1. Open the Start menu, type "Create a restore point", and select the top result.
2. In the System Properties window, click on the "System Protection" tab and then click "System Restore".
3. Follow the on-screen instructions to choose a restore point from before the issue occurred.
4. Click "Next" and then "Finish" to start the system restore process.
5. Wait for the process to complete and then restart your computer.

If none of the above solutions work, you may need to consider performing a clean installation of Windows using installation media. However, before doing so, ensure that you have backed up all your important files and data to avoid losing them during the process. By following these solutions, you should be able to fix the "Undoing changes made to your computer" error and restore your system to normal functioning.
