Plenty of others share similar stories: using TweetDelete to prepare for job applications, manage public-facing accounts, or simply tidy up after a change in interests or career direction.

It's worth noting that X's API does have limits. If you're trying to delete a very large number of tweets at once, you might run into some throttling. That's not TweetDelete's fault - it's simply how the platform works today.
